

## NEWSLETTER 41 – SEPTEMBER 2009

Dear Supporter, As far as the Mouse is concerned, 2009 has certainly been an *annus mirabilis*. Our trip to the States was as exciting and productive as we had hoped. Thanks to the generosity of Cambridge University Press, we spent four lovely days in New York. As well as meeting the CUP sales team in their marvellous offices overlooking the Hudson River, I also delivered a 'webinar' presentation. I spoke about the history of *Minimus* and why I believe it is important for young children to enjoy and benefit from Latin. My talk could be heard by teachers all over America; when I finished, they had the opportunity to ask me questions and both their questions and my answers could also be heard by everyone participating. I marvel at the technology! I am grateful to Jim Harmon of CUP for inviting us and setting up these events. We then moved to Baltimore. Ruth Ann Besse, a member of the CUP committee, had organised several *Minimus* events. We began with a training day at Pallotti High School in Laurel, near Baltimore. Some of the delegates were practising teachers and some not, some were homeschooling parents, some were experienced Classics teachers and some had no Latin at all. They were all united in wanting to find out more about how best to deliver the book. One delegate brought her eight month old baby girl who happily crawled around during the proceedings! The following day we held a Latin event at a local community centre where people were invited to drop in to watch a Roman Army re-enactment group, to hear stories from mythology and to experience *Minimus* taster lessons. Over one hundred people attended the event. My classes varied from twenty-five adults and children, who acted out the first story in *Minimus*, to three very bright boys who were nearly at the end of *Minimus Secundus* and were keen to learn the Greek alphabet. My third class involved three little girls, one of whom aged five, had only recently begun to read. She enjoyed playing the mouse and was chased around the room by the cat- her Mum. The following day we held a similar event at Laurel Library. This again attracted over 100. Families loved seeing the Roman Army Group and listening to Ruth Ann telling myths and I had a steady stream of punters to learn Latin. Finally we moved to Pittsburgh, where we spent four nights with another member of our Committee, Zee Ann Poerio. Again we enjoyed a series of different events. The first was a tour of a local historic farm house followed by an English tea party and lunch. The house was fascinating, the food delicious and all served with a rather Jane Austen-like gentility and finesse. Large picture hats were provided for us all to wear and after we had finished eating, I talked to the delegates (mostly teachers) about *Minimus*. We attracted a full page spread in the local paper, complete with a photograph of Zee Ann and I in our hats! It was a unique event for *Minimus*. The following day we were in the impressive Carnegie Museum where I was one of several presenters. This was more of a practical *Minimus* training session for teachers. That evening I ran a *Minimus* taster lesson for children at Zee Ann Poerio's school. About twenty children, aged six to fourteen, came for a taster lesson accompanied by their parents. After we had studied the birthday invitation, this lead neatly into the fact that *Minimus* celebrated his 10<sup>th</sup> birthday one month later. Zee Ann had organised a birthday cake, balloons etc and the children all enjoyed singing happy birthday to *Minimus* in Latin. I confess I found it very moving to think of the last ten years. Who would have thought when I had the original idea for the book that ten years later I would be enjoying a birthday party for the mouse in Pittsburgh?! On the following day, we had a session at the local Barnes & Noble bookstore, where I spoke about *Minimus* as a cross-curricular course and signed books.

We are so grateful to CUP, Ruth Ann and Zee Ann for setting up an unforgettable fortnight. Our thanks are also due to Sir Jeremy Morse who paid for our travel. His ongoing support of the PLP is deeply appreciated.

**USA teachers to tour Hadrian's Wall –Summer 2010?** Several of the teachers we met expressed an interest in visiting Hadrian's Wall next summer, and in particular Vindolanda, home of *Minimus*. We have had two very enjoyable training days. Linda Soames invited us to St Hugh's Farringdon, where Jane Maguire and Shona Shahryar were the speakers; I know delegates found their talks very helpful. At our final training day at James Allen's Girls School in Dulwich the speakers were Oliver Makower and Michelle Anderson. I am so grateful to them for giving up their time and for providing such practical help for all of us.

## Recent School Visits

**June : St Hugh's Farringdon.** I enjoyed working with several classes and hearing them perform short dialogues; they showed me their entries for the *Minimus* Mythology Competition and the *Minimus* club joined me for lunch. In the afternoon, we took over the main hall and the children performed plays that they had entered for the competition in previous years and recited poems they had written about Greek Mythology. It was all work of a very high standard and I enjoyed hearing the children and commenting on their work.

**June : Our Lady of the Rosary Catholic Primary School in Bristol.** I taught groups from Years 4 & 5 and watched an excellent production of 'Palla Rubra' (Little Red Riding Hood) performed in front of the whole school. They had gone to town on costumes and props and it was a great success. I am grateful to their teacher Judith O'Neill for agreeing to share her experiences in teaching *Minimus* in a state primary at the Bristol training day in January.

**June: Bredon Hill Middle School, near Evesham** where I taught several taster lessons for years 4-6 and talked about the benefits of learning Latin.

**July: Yately Manor Prep School in Hampshire** .I worked with several classes and advised teachers, especially on pronunciation. This is an obvious area of concern, especially for non-specialists; remember that there is pronunciation help given in the Teachers' Resource Book and the CDs are an invaluable help. I personally use the CD in just about every *Minimus* lesson that I teach.

**July :** I ran a *Minimus* inset event for Peterborough LEA. Twenty Gifted and Talented children from several local primary schools met at Heritage Park School where I taught a taster *Minimus* lesson, watched by teachers, G&T co-ordinators etc. Several of the schools have decided to adopt *Minimus*. It is a great privilege working with such able children who seem quite unperturbed by performing in front of teachers and parents!

## Mythology Competition

I am very grateful to Pam Macklin for her continuing work with this aspect of the Project. Here is her report "The 2009 Mythology competition was organized again by Pam Macklin and sponsored by the Jowett Trustees. Once again the competition produced a superb range of entries, including some from the United States. Many thanks to all teachers who encouraged their pupils to take part then found the time to digitally photograph those entries for e-mail to the organiser. Diana and Brian Sparkes, having retired from the Management Committee, were delighted to maintain their links with the project by judging this year's entries. There were thirty individual prizes, some of which were designated "Special". School's prizes for the best set of entries were awarded to Clifton High, Bristol and St Hugh's, Farringdon, Oxon. The competition topics for 2010 are *Minimus* – 'The Trojan Horse' and *Minimus Secundus* – 'Romulus and Remus'. Further details, rules and closing date will be available in the autumn. ## Other Recent Events

**April :** I attended a meeting of the Round Table Classics Group at the City Hall at the invitation of **Boris Johnson**. Boris is keen to spread Latin through London state schools and a large number of us met to brainstorm ideas on the best way of doing this. Subsequently, just six of us met again in May to formalise our plans. At the end of the Spring Term we will be inviting Head Teachers, Gifted and Talented co-ordinators, curriculum planners etc to a special reception hosted by Boris at which several of us will have the opportunity to talk briefly about our material and the importance of Classics. On the same day, **Caroline Lawrence** invited me to celebrate sales of 100,000 copies with lunch in the British Museum. Caroline is the highly successful author of the Roman Mystery Series, which is targeted at primary school children. I am thrilled that Caroline has agreed to join the PLP Committee; we are all looking forward to working with her in the future.

**June:** I was invited to give the after-lunch Speech at the Annual Luncheon of the **Queen's English Society**. I last spoke to them in 2001 so it was amazing to reflect how **Minimus** and the Project have developed in the intervening eight years.
